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21st Century Learning and the Library

The term 21st century learner has been a popular buzz word for some time now. But what exactly does that mean? Some define it in terms of what students do, for example collaborate, think critically, problem solve. Others define it using environmental characteristics such as connectedness, 24/7 access, and rich media.

Your school library helps support both definitions of 21st century learners. However, this year Harlingen CISD libraries have been working more on the characteristics associated with the 21st century learning environment. School libraries build connectedness by offering a

place for the faculty and students to gather in small groups and in larger numbers. In both elementary and secondary libraries, small groups are readily visible hovering together around tables or computer stations. They are working collaboratively on classroom assignments or a shared common interest they are pursuing on their own outside of class work.

Connectedness is a big part of learning, feeling a part of something bigger. Libraries have resources to help connect classroom learning with the world outside of the school walls.

24/7 access has been another focus. Through the databases purchased through Region

One, the library has made access to information available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Students and faculty have unlimited access to research and information *anytime, anywhere and from any device* with internet access. Talk to your librarian if you need your campus' username and password.

Another 24/7 availability is Destiny Quest. This app allows you to search through your campus' library collection from any device with internet access. You can also access your library's collection through the regular library website. You can even put items on hold to pick up when you return to the campus. Again, talk to your librarian to get instructions on using this app. What a great

tool for lesson planning when you are away from the campus!

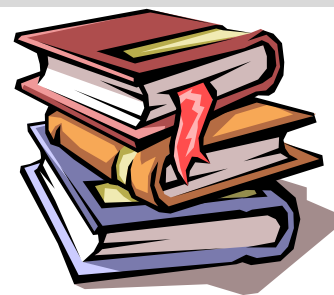

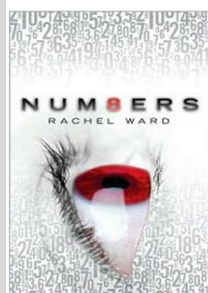
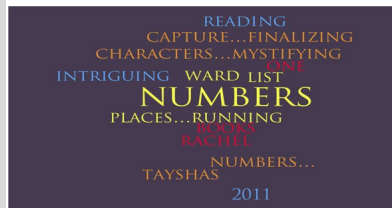
TAYSHAS Reading List

This list is compiled by the TAYSHAS High School Reading List Committee under the umbrella of the Texas Library Association. **The TAYSHAS project's mission is to encourage "young adults to become lifelong readers and to participate in the community of**

readers in Texas." The organization serves as a reading incentive program for Texas young adults in grades 9 through 12 who read for pleasure.

Jem, a fifteen-year-old foster child, finds trouble everywhere she turns. She does not trust others and does not build rela-

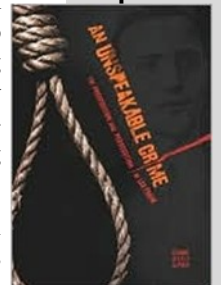
tionships well. She fears attachment to others as her special gift allows her to see the date of someone's death. Like a walking time bomb, her gift incites fear, regret and recklessness.

An Unspeakable Crime: The Prosecution and Persecution of Leo Frank

Leo Frank was a Jewish American factory worker who was convicted of murdering thirteen-year-old Mary Phagan. Later he was kidnapped from prison and hung by a mob.

In Atlanta, Georgia, on April 23, 1917, Mary Phagan was on her way to a parade when she stopped at the National Pencil Factory to collect her weekly paycheck. Never to be seen alive again, wild accusations and raw emotions ran rampant throughout Atlanta. The factory's superintendent, Leo Frank, became the prime suspect in a murder case that created a two-year media frenzy. Anti-Semitism distorted the crime investigation which led to the subsequent prosecution of Leo Frank and his ultimate death.

In a time when the world is shock full of technology and a child's view of the world is like a busy tablet of apps or a graphic novel layout, we must brace ourselves and teach in the same manner. Gone are the days of floppy disks, compact discs or even pen drives. Readily accessible online tools with links to videos, audio, websites, widgets, blogs, and an array of other technology and multimedia virtual tools are the latest "things" which both students and staff need to keep up with the learners of today.

[Glogster EDU](#) is a collaborative online learning platform for teachers and students to use to create a glog. A glog is an interactive poster which students can use to create a project versus the traditional book report or PowerPoint. A glog places everything you need online and available to you, such as sound bites, videos, lessons, and links. Students can work on glogs from their own account either at home or at school.

Yet another great tool for the 21st century educator is Edmodo. Edmodo is a secure social network, which has a user interface such as that of Facebook but is strictly man-

aged by the teacher. The teacher creates the classes or "groups" and invites only certain students to join. Assignments can be posted directly on the wall of this online tool, and students will then submit them as they are completed.

Books Worth Reading

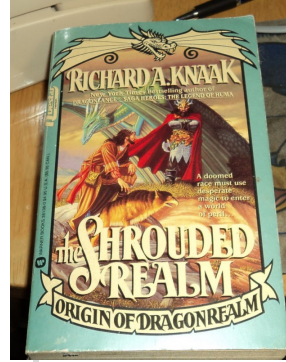

The Shrouded Realm is the fifth book in a series called Legends of the Dragonrealm, written by Richard A. Knaak. Knaak is the best selling fantasy author of over forty novels and novellas. In my opinion, his experience shows through complicated characters, an intricate plotline with many mini-climaxes that always keep you on your toes and guessing even when the story is over, and much more.

You may have asked yourself why I am starting off with book number five rather than book number one. Knaak wrote this very much like Star Wars. 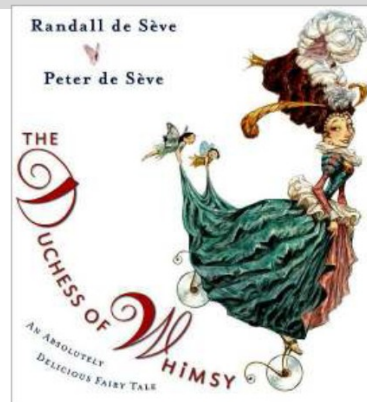
